What is Cardiac Amyloidosis?

Amyloidosis is a clinical disorder that occurs when a protein called "amyloid" builds up in various organs in the body. When amyloid deposits in the heart, it interferes with normal cardiac function and causes the disease cardiac amyloidosis. Patients with this condition may experience swelling in the belly or legs or feel short of breath. Amyloid can also invade numerous other organs like the skin and nerves, which can lead to easy bruising or numbness in the hands or feet.
